Presenter Sam Dinga described his many experiences with developing water wells in his home country in Africa, the Cameroons.

- After UWSP Sam worked at the Boys and Girls Club where he continues to volunteer.
- One assumption we tend to make is that fresh water is generally available throughout the world. Even if the water is fresh that doesn't mean potable. And, too frequently it is miles and miles to any water source.
- But the statistics are terrible –
 - 1.8 die each year from bad water.
 - One half of the world's kids missing school is related bad water.
 - There are at least eleven major diseases attributable to bad water.
- Sam had twenty kids in his family. Potable water was a daily struggle.
- One of Sam's sisters died young and Sam has dedicated his water project in her name – **Ma-Kah Project** - fresh water for the Cameroons. She was a nurse volunteer. Sam's Project goal is forty wells in 40 years.
 - <http://thewaterproject.org/> provides very sobering statistics on the dilemma of poor/unhealthy/scarcity of clean, potable water.
 - But one of the greatest causes of poverty in Africa is also the most overlooked...the lack of access to clean drinking water.
 - Nearly one billion people do not have access to clean, safe water. For these people, poverty is a fact of life.
 - At any one time, half of the world's hospital beds are occupied by patients suffering from water-borne diseases.
 - Over one-third of the world's population has no access to sanitation facilities.
 - In developing countries, about 80% of illnesses are linked to poor water and sanitation conditions.
 - 1 out of every 4 deaths under the age of 5 worldwide is due to a water-related disease.
 - In developing countries, it is common for water collectors, usually women and girls, to have to walk several kilometers every day to fetch water. Once filled, pots and jerry cans weigh as much as 44lbs.
- The project targets are well pumps easily maintained; a community 'water' committee will maintain, hold the cost per well to \$5K; no real tools required for maintenance; digging the well by hand generally from 40 – 160' deep; hopefully a well can be completed in 2-3 days but it's hard, hard work.

- One of the first communities to get a well had been carrying water 4-5 miles, and much contaminated.
- One interesting question – how do you locate a well site – ‘water witching,’ believe it or not. If you’re not familiar with ‘witching’ look it up on Wikipedia. Water witching, also called dousing, works.
- Water from these well is ‘ice-cold’ at least compared to the outside ambient temperature, and it’s pure!
- The first well in the project is the Sackmann Family commemorative well
- Guest Dani Aldayuz, noted that her older sister, a 4th year medical student at Un of Virginia has spent a summer in Ghana, South Africa teaching health practices including potable water. Sister Angie noted upon return exactly what Sam says, water is a major, major problem for the growth and prosperity of African counties.

From Rotary International -

25 years and only an Inch to GO!

After more than 25 years of hard work, Rotary and its partners are now “This Close” to eradicating polio, and a wide array of public figures and celebrities from Bill Gates to Ziggy Marley have signed on to help Rotary spread the word. Now, the general public is invited to join them in an online campaign at www.thisclose.net.

At an online application, visitors can upload their image into an online version of the existing public service announcement, wearing “End Polio” t-shirt, with fingers held up in a simple hand gesture to show that Rotary is “this close” to wiping out polio worldwide.

They can share their virtual pledge through FaceBook and Twitter, and browse an interactive map and gallery of participants from across the globe. The final ads are entered into a gallery that includes Archbishop Emeritus Desmond Tutu and a diverse lineup of influential leaders and personalities.

The “This Close” public service campaign includes action movie star Jackie Chan, conservationist Dr. Jane Goodall, premier violinist Itzhak Perlman, Grammy Award winners A.R. Rahman, Angelique Kidjo and Ziggy Marley, golfing great Jack Nicklaus, and peace advocate Queen Noor of Jordan. Nicklaus, Perlman and Tutu are themselves survivors of this crippling disease.

Developed and produced by Evanston-based I-Imagine, the www.thisclose.net application follows the success of a previous virtual campaign, www.kickpoliooutofafrica.org/, which gathered more than 11,000 online signatures in support of polio eradication in the lead up to the 2010 World Cup.

Polio eradication has been Rotary’s top priority for more than two decades. The international humanitarian service organization is a spearheading partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, along with the World Health Organization, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and UNICEF.

Rotary club members worldwide have contributed more than \$1 billion and countless volunteer hours to the polio eradication effort, and have recently pledged to raise an additional US\$200 million to match \$355 million in challenge grants from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. All of the resulting \$555 million will be spent in support of eradication activities.

Great progress has been made, and the incidence of polio infection has plunged from about 350,000 cases in 1988 to fewer than 1,300 reported cases in 2010. More than two billion children have been immunized in 122 countries, preventing five million cases of paralysis and 250,000 pediatric deaths.
